

Dangerous Goods Policy

Dangerous goods and substances can endanger persons and aircraft. Its important to read and comply to our Dangerous Goods policy before packing your bags so you know what to avoid taking with you on the plane.

Forbidden items are articles or substances which pose health and safety hazards to passengers or which may damage the aircraft. These items must not be brought on board. All forbidden items are listed below.

A. guns, firearms and other devices that discharge projectiles – devices capable, or appearing capable, of being used to cause serious injury by discharging a projectile, including:

- firearms of all types, such as pistols, revolvers, rifles, shotguns
- toy guns, replicas and imitation firearms capable of being mistaken for real weapons.
- component parts of firearms, excluding telescopic sights
- compressed air or CO2 guns, such as pistols, pellet guns, rifles and ball bearing guns
- signal flare pistols and starter pistols
- bows, cross bows and arrows
- harpoon guns and spear guns
- slingshots and catapults

B. stunning devices – devices designed specifically to stun or immobilise, including:

- devices for shocking, such as stun guns, tasers and stun batons
- animal stunners and animal killers
- disabling and incapacitating chemicals, gases and sprays, such as mace, pepper sprays, capsicum sprays, tear gas, acid sprays and animal repellent sprays

C. objects with a sharp point or sharp edge – objects with a sharp point or sharp edge capable of being used to cause serious injury, including:

- items designed for chopping, such as axes, hatchets and cleavers
- ice axes and ice picks
- razor blades
- box cutters
- knives with blades of more than 6 cm scissors with blades of more than 6 cm measured from the fulcrum
- material arts equipment with a sharp point or sharp edge
- swards and sabres

D. workmen's tools – tools capable of being used either to cause serious injury or to threaten the safety of aircraft, including:

- crowbars
- drills and drill bits, including cordless portable power drills
- tools with a blade or a shaft of more than 6 cm capable of use as a weapon, such as screwdrivers and chisels
- saws, including cordless portable power saws
- blowtorches
- bolt guns and nail guns

E. blunt instruments – objects capable of being used to cause serious injury when used to hit, including:

- baseball and softball bats
- clubs and batons, such as billy club's blackjacks and night sticks
- martial arts equipment

Liquids, aerosols and gels

In accordance with Regulation (EU) No. 2015/1998 effective since 5 November 2015:

On flights within the EU and on connecting flights from the EU, the following regulations apply to liquids in carryon baggage:

- containers with liquids and gel-like products may contain up to 100 ml (the printed maximum quantity applies)
- all containers must be carried in a transparent resealable plastic bag of a capacity not exceeding 1 litre), one bag per person
- the bag must be presented separately at the security control
- medicines and special food (eg baby food) which is needed during a flight may be transported and must be presented at the security control.
- Articles and plastic bags that do not meet these stipulations cannot be taken on board. Similar regulations for liquids apply to flights to and connections in Malta.

Right to refuse baggage

If we find that any of your baggage contains items that you are not allowed to carry, we will refuse to carry the baggage any further while it contains those items.

We may refuse to accept baggage that, in our reasonable opinion, is not properly and securely packed in suitable containers.
